Controlling a project team of very experienced (and much older) men, communicating with the customer in a politically sensitive environment, managing all supplier contacts, and writing internal reports were all part of my responsibilities. A perfect learning school! Even though I enjoyed the learning progress and responsibilities, I realized that my interests lie elswhere. I wanted to work in industries where innovation becomes tangible: like in retail and FMCG. I looked for companies that sell products that really interest me. I found a job as Innovation Process Coordinator at Rituals, a very innovative and fast-growing company. Rituals differs radically from my previous employer.
